Comic Book Tells Story of Michigan's First Pride Event (EASTERN)

The story of Christopher
Street Detroit '72, the first-ever
LGBTQ+ pride celebration in
Michigan, has been brought
to life through a full-color,
32-page nonfiction comic
book. Freelance illustrator
Isabel Clare Paul and historian
Tim Retzloff teamed up to
create "Come Out! In Detroit"
based on eyewitness primary
sources, oral histories, and
a cache of largely unseen
photographs.

On June 24, 1972, Michiganders gathered to publicly parade down Woodward Avenue. The day's events capped a week of celebrations at universities throughout the state. The comic book's release—timed to mark the fiftieth anniversary of the event—is accompanied by exhibits and public programs in Detroit, Ann Arbor, and East Lansing. There will be 23,000 copies freely distributed in various locations around Michigan.
